Responding to Community Need

Each year, the Counseling Service of Addison County (CSAC) grows in new ways—responding to the changing needs of our community while holding fast to our mission of supporting wellness, inclusion, and high-quality care in mental health, substance use, and developmental services. This year marked an especially important milestone: the completion of our **Community Needs Assessment (CNA),** one of the most comprehensive efforts in our history.

The CNA reflects the voices of hundreds of community members, partners, and staff who shared what they see, experience, and hope for in Addison County's system of care. It shows both our progress and our remaining challenges. Thousands of people in our region experience mental health or substance use challenges each year. At the same time, the data show that CSAC reaches far more people with serious mental illness than national averages—and that our services are deeply trusted by those who depend on them most. These findings are guiding our transformation into a Certified Community-Based integrated Health Center (CCBHC). This model—now being implemented statewide—will strengthen crisis response, expand access to care, and ensure that services are available to everyone, regardless of insurance or income. It's an ambitious goal, but one rooted in our belief that high-quality, coordinated care should be a community standard, not a privilege.

While we prepare for this next chapter, we continue to invest in what makes CSAC strong: our people and our partnerships.

CSAC's Developmental Services (DS) Program

is at the heart of a strong, inclusive community empowering individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities to thrive. Together with families, we create opportunities for independence, connection, and personal growth.

Over the past year, we've supported 186 individuals through tailored services, including residential and shared living, supported employment, independent living, and individualized goal-setting.


Speak Up participants also plan fun gatherings based on participant interest, like last January's game night with music, dancing, and food.

Adult Mental Health Services

CSAC's Adult Mental Health program provides personalized, holistic care to meet the diverse needs of our community. From counseling and addiction recovery to psychiatric services, we support each person's path to wellness. With timely access to care, in-office individual and group therapy, *Evergreen House*, therapeutic and transitional group residences, and a continuum of crisis services—including our 24/7 Emergency & Crisis Team, *Interlude Mental Health Urgent Care*, and *Rapid Access*, which ensures quick access to mental health services when individuals need it—we're here when it matters most.

CSAC's Interlude Adult Mental Health Urgent Care team was there for individuals in times of urgent mental health need and crisis—supporting sixty-four individuals, totaling 387 visits and follow up services in FY 2025

CSAC's Clinical Internship Program Expands Access

- CSAC's Adult Mental Health internship program for master's level clinical interns reduces barriers, quickly connects people to critical services, and provides consistent curriculum and well-rounded introduction to community mental health experience for those entering the field.
- Six interns provided 461 hours of outreach and mental health support to Charter House guests in FY 25.

"The coolest part about the intern outreach is that no one even realizes it's happening. There's something about stepping through the walls of an office building where connection opportunities are lost. With the outreach you have organic moments where you find yourself building trust in a less formal way. It's a huge win to get more of that in our community."

Safe, Stable Housing is Essential to Mental Health

When people face housing insecurity or unsafe living conditions, stress and instability can intensify existing mental health challenges. CSAC's Adult Mental Health program helps address this critical connection by providing consultation, support, and resources to secure and maintain housing. We connect clients to Department of Mental Health housing contingency funds to assist with housing related costs like rent, security deposits, moving costs, and safety needs like air conditioners and grab bars. We ensure clients have the stability they need to focus on recovery and well-being. Over the past year, CSAC provided housing contingency support to 22 individuals working toward greater stability and independence, many of whom live on fixed Social Security income.

Group Residences Offer Stability and Support

Our Intensive Adult Mental Health Program staffs and manages two **group residences.**Robinson House is a licensed Therapeutic Community Residence, while Hill House is a transitional group residence. Both provide safe, stable housing and individualized supports.



Youth and Family Services

We believe that supporting children, youth, and families is the foundation of a strong, healthy community. Our Youth and Family Services program helps young people ages 5–22 and their families navigate life's challenges with care and expertise. We provide support for anxiety, depression, trauma, substance use, ADHD, autism, and family conflict—empowering youth and families to build resilience and thrive.



Our services include individual, family, and group counseling; school-based therapy and one-on-one supports; 24/7 crisis response; family care coordination; psychiatric care; and our JOBS program, which helps youth ages 16–22 prepare for and succeed in employment.

Explorers Group: Mindfulness For Resiliency, Awareness, and Skill Building

Paul Caron, Family Outreach/Access Clinician has been with CSAC for almost 24 years! For the past 6 years, Paul has co-run the *Explorers* group, a mindfulness-based therapy group for elementary age kids which supports resilience, awareness of body and emotions, and prosocial/friendship skills.

"You see kids come out of their shells & really enjoying themselves. It feels like such a gift. We don't post a 'schedule,' for the kids, I think they feel comfort and safety in the routine and ritual of how we do things. I see impact in the moment—happy kids. It's all about giving kind attention to yourself and other people. It's about being aware in the moment of what you are feeling. Kids also have agency within Explorers: opportunities for them to lead activities & volunteer for certain things." Paul Caron



Explorers uses games, breathing exercises, and sensory experience to enhance emotional, social, and sensory awareness. These can include yoga, singing, short meditation exercises, nature, and art experiences. Explorers supported twenty-one youth in FY 2025!

Trainings for School Staff Bring CSAC and School Districts Together

CSAC Youth and Families Intensive School Supports
Program (ISSP) staff offers **monthly training for school district teachers and support staff** in supporting students
with unique emotional and behavioral needs in our schools—
an offering unique to Addison County.

"We began these trainings in Spring 2024 because we saw an **increase in acuity and student needs,** coupled with widespread staffing shortages across school districts—coming together was essential."

The first training was so popular, **CSAC now offers monthly trainings for all Addison County school districts**: ANWSD, ACSD, MAUSD, and Lincoln. Teachers, paraprofessionals, and any staff working directly with the students are welcome, and CSAC ISS staff facilitate the trainings. One hundred people on average attend!

Example training topics:

- Foundational principals that are relevant to supporting students
- How to identify skill deficits and various need
- How to support kids in the moment
- Neurodiversity and Autism
- Teaching kids frustration tolerance

The team bases trainings on feedback from school staff: what do they see in the classroom and what resources and skills do they need to to best support their students?

Trainings bring CSAC and school districts together, exemplifying shared belonging, skill building, and community resiliency building!

Community Connection

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In May, CSAC hosted Me2/ **Classical Music for Mental** Health: an evening of music and connection at Middlebury Union High School. Save the date for

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


